KDA Loses Two Key Contributors

2023 ended on a sad note for KDA with the loss of two of our most active and valued members. Both these men dedicated their lives to supporting KDA and KD patients, and made lasting contributions to our association. As we mourn their loss, we will honor David's and Bob's memories by dedicating our association to work even harder to find a cure for Kennedy's Disease.



David Yelton, KDA Treasurer and Board member, died on December 18, age 70, from complications resulting from a bad fall. David was very active in the KDA since his initial diagnosis. (A "professional volunteer," David was also a founding board member of Interfaith Hospitality Network of Warren County, now known as Family Promise of Warren County.) He served on the KDA Board for many years as Secretary and, most recently, as Treasurer where he applied the accounting, auditing, and management skills honed during his career at NCR Corporation and Duke Energy to maintaining KDA's financial records. His insights helped KDA achieve its highest-ever funding levels, providing the funds for more than \$430,000 in grants and fellowships in 2023.



Bob Borden, long-time KD patient and KDA volunteer, died suddenly on November 2, age 67. Diagnosed with KD at 29, Bob focused on a non-physical career in environmental engineering. After earning a PhD at Rice University, he became a professor at N.C. State University where he invented processes that are now the most widely used technologies in the world for remediating groundwater contamination. Bob was also a committed KDA volunteer. In 2023 alone, he edited the KDA newsletter, developed "onepagers" or short reference guides for KD patients and doctors, established a link between KDA and the Muscular Dystrophy Association, and revised the Wikipedia pages on Kennedy's Disease and the KDA.

International Kennedy's Disease Conference - 2023

KD-UK and the University College of London (UCL) hosted a four-day international conference on Kennedy's Disease in early November 2023.

The first two days were patient-focused and can be viewed online (links to the right).

Day One included clinical descriptions of KD, ongoing research in UK KD labs, presentations by patient advocacy groups, and a breakout session for KD men.

Day Two included presentations on respiratory and bulbar management, physical activity, mobility and home adaptations for KD patients, and the genetics of Kennedy's Disease. The second day also included updates on clinical trials, a researcher roundtable chaired by Dr. Fischbeck, and a keynote address on Huntington's Disease.

The third and fourth days were devoted to scientific presentations by and for KD researchers. KDA provided sponsorship support for both conferences. The patient days and scientific conference were wellattended and included several KDA
